Syllabus

ART 3015-001 /Methods & Materials of Art

Fall, 2015 / R. Hayes / Meets Thursdays 9:10-12:05 in ART 273 / 3 Credit Hours

COURSE DESCRIPTION

In this studio course, students will explore the properties and uses of multiple artistic materials as tools for supporting the artistic development of children and youth. Students will have numerous opportunities to engage in hands-on experimentation with multiple types of artistic media as they consider how best to apply these processes to visual art education. This semester, our studio work will emphasize integrating science, sustainability and personal identity rich artistic exploration. Students will learn to craft artistic curriculum that is integrated with other classroom themes and standards.

TEACHING & LEARNING METHODS

As part of the course, students will engage in studio work; participate in discussions; make presentations; develop curriculum; co-teach; document their teaching experience; and create amazing artwork.

OBJECTIVES

Students who have successfully completed the course should:

- Develop an understanding of comprehensive art education pedagogy
- Understand the importance of integrating the visual arts across the curriculum
- Get studio experience with multiple types of artistic media, including: printmaking, drawing, painting, photography, bookmaking, papermaking, mask-making, and various sculptural techniques
- Get hands-on experience planning and teaching an interdisciplinary visual arts lesson

COURSE REQUIREMENTS, GRADING & POLICY

Weekly Experiments, Blog Entries & In-Class Studio Work (35 Points) Each week in class, we will be exploring different studio art practices and art education concepts. To prepare for each workshop, you will be assigned preparatory readings, experiments, collection assignments, reflection writings, etc. These will each be contained in the Weekly Experiment. These are your one-stop-shops for what to do to get ready for each class. Some work will be assigned as part of a very simple Tumblr blog which you will maintain as part of your work this semester. Integrated and Sequential Unit and Lesson Plan (15 points) As an individual or small group, you will create an integrated lesson plan and teaching unit. This will include:

>>>Unit plan: This 1-2 page document should contain: 1) theme; 2) goals; 3) concepts to be taught; 4) list of visual examples to be used; 5) sequence of 4-5 lessons (one of these lessons will be the one you

co-teach to the class)
>>>Detailed lesson plan for one lesson in the unit, which includes a critique, rubric and at least three
resources (websites, books, etc.)
>>>Visuals
--visual examples, which can provide aesthetic, art historical or other info.: e.g. a PowerPoint, art objects
or artifacts, posters, or other visual examples
--an example of the artistic product the students will make
>>> Due November 12th

Active Teaching (20 points) As an individual or small group, you will teach your lesson to a small group in a family, community, social or fellow-student setting. You will document this and post documentation to your Tumblr.

Artist Object Project (15 points) This object will be discussed as we progress through the semester and is meant to be an organic reflection of your philosophy of art education and how it evolves throughout the semester (TBD). >>>Due last day of class

Active Participation (15 points) You are expected to come to class having read the assigned readings and prepared to discuss them. In addition, your full participation in class discussions, activities and weekly reflections is very important.

Please Note: Late assignments will be reduced by 10% for each day late.
