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Teacher Preparation Framework

A professional teacher is reflective and responsive, attends to research, and builds relationships among diverse people, ideas, and perspectives.

Course Description

This capstone experience will assist teacher candidates in developing their professional voices through the exploration of significant issues in educational settings through professional development projects and seminar discussions.

Prerequisites: Admittance in the Elementary Certification Licensure Program and a passing grade in all methods courses leading up to this experience. Teacher candidates are required to receive a grade of "C" or better in this course in order to complete the Elementary Licensure Program.

Course Objectives

By the end of this course, each student is expected to have accomplished the following:

- 1. Demonstrate knowledge of and ability to participate in professional development and reflective practice through individually designed projects that have strong ties to current educational research, policy, and/or current events. UETS 9:44, 9:47
- 2. Demonstrate an understanding of the professional standards for teachers through the development of a professional electronic portfolio based on the Utah Effective Teaching Standards. UETS: All Standards
- 3. Read and discuss an educational related book for professional development. UETS 9:43, 9:46, 9:47

Assignment Descriptions

I DO NOT ACCEPT LATE WORK. For every day an assignment is late, 10% will be deducted off the grade.

1. Professional Development

50 points Proposal Due: Jan. 29 Final Project Due: April 23

(Graduate students need 80 points. 40 of those 80 points need to come from options a. b. or c.)

- **a.** Action Research: Researching and applying that research into your classroom. Your paper will need, at least, three cites. You can earn 10 more points by presenting your findings at an educational conference. More explanation will be presented during class. **40 points**
- **b.** Service Learning Project: Refer to what you learned about service learning last semester, and implement a new service learning project this semester. **40 points**
- **c.** Research Paper: Ask yourself an educationally related question. Research it. Your paper will need, at least, three cites. **40 points**
- **d.** Workshop/Class/Conference: Take a class from the district office or from UEN or attend an educationally related conference. Given what you learned, write a paper about how this will impact your teaching practice. http://www.uen.org/development, http://www.slcschools.org/departments/professional-development/

- **e.** Focused Classroom Visits: Visit 3 classrooms that are very different from the one you are currently in. Write a reflection on each of the visits. Where did you visit? What did you observe? What do you make of this experience? What did you learn from this visit that you can implement into your own practice? **10 points for each visit. 3 visit limit.**
- **f.** Continue working with your class during the month of April. If you choose this option, you will need to spend a total of 50 hours during April. Those 50 hours may be split up any way depending on what your personal schedule dictates. During this "extra" time in the filed, you'll need to submit a log of your daily activities. **30** points
- g. Trade Day: Like last semester, you can spend ½ -1 day trading places with a peer. After your experience, please write a one page reflection paper. 15 points
- **h.** Be a Judge. See flyer for more information for Utah History Fair. Or, be a Science Fair Judge. There are many schools during this time of the year that need science fair judges. After the experience, write a one page reflection about the experience. **20 points**
- i. Spend some time at a corporate training function to see how they run their educational programs. More information about this option will be shared in class. After the experience, write a one page reflection about the experience. 20 points.
- **j.** Develop your own plan for professional development. Make an appointment with me, and we'll finalize your idea. **TBD points**

2. Book Club

50 points

Due: April 16

Chose an educationally related book from the list provided. (Formed groups at the end of fall semester.)Form a group of three to five people to form a book club. Near the end of the semester, your group will present the contents of your book to the rest of the cohort. More information will be provided during class meetings.

3. Electronic Portfolio

80 points

Due: March 5 and April 2

During the semester you will be preparing a Professional Portfolio that serves three purposes. First of all, the portfolio will be used during the interview process. Secondly, the portfolio is a chance to reflect and articulate critical teaching issues. Lastly, a

portfolio serves as a beginning to a professional portfolio that will be needed in order to obtain a Level II license. Your professional portfolio must be developed along Utah Effective Teaching Standards. There are 10 Standards and you'll need 1 artifact per Standard. The most important aspect of your portfolio is your rationale statements. This is a statement that accompanies each artifact that explains why and how that artifact meets that particular Standard.

4. Service Learning (CEL) Project Presentation 30 points

Due: April 1

On April 1, 2015 from 3:30-5:00 in SAEC, you will formally present your CEL Project at the College of Education Research Fair. This is the same project that you started during fall semester in your Social Studies Methods course. If you are unable to present on April 1, 2015, you will present on April 24, 2015 at the STE Appreciation Luncheon. For those who present on April 1st, we encourage you to bring and share your presentation at the STE Appreciation Lunch for Site Teachers can see all the many possibilities for Community Engaged projects.

Using a tri-fold presentation board, your presentation should address the following information:

Project Title Grade Level Description of the Project

Utah Core Curriculum links to Social Studies and other integrated curriculum.

References: Cite at least 3 research articles.

What did students learned socially, emotionally, ethically about being a citizen? What you learned about service learning as pedagogy?

Bring your Field Journal and other artifacts to place in front of your poster.

Please remember that there should be more pictures than words on your tri-fold presentation. People who attend the Research Fair will stop and talk to you if they are drawn to your presentation by having a clean, neat, and organized poster. Please dress professionally and arrive ahead of time to get set up.

5. Classroom Management Plan

50 points Due: April 13

Now that student teaching is nearing the end and you've experienced the "real world", reread the fall version of your Classroom Management Plan and revise. When you turn in your revised plan, please include the plan you submitted for fall semester. This document will be added to your Professional Electronic Portfolio.

6. Professionalism:

70 points Due: Everyday

Professionalism points will be based on class participation, attendance, making arrangements to visit school sites in a professional manner, displaying positive attitudes towards teaching, learning, and towards peers, taking time to reflect upon your professional experiences, sharing ideas with other, asking questions, etc. For more information regarding professionalism, please refer to the Student Teaching Handbook which is located at: http://uite.utah.edu/student-teaching/index.php Points will be awarded holistically. Being late and/or absent will result in lower professionalism points. You will earn 5 points each time you arrive on time to class. 3 points if you arrive late or leave early.
