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#### **COURSE GOALS & OBJECTIVES**

The goal of this course is to provide an overview of a variety of topics that are related to Indigenous peoples in the United States. You will be conversant in the educational, political, social, and economic forces that have, and continue, to impact American Indians. You are encouraged to pursue study in other Ethnic Studies courses about American Indians if you enjoy this class. By the end of the semester, each student will be able to:

- Explain the unique relationship between American Indian peoples and the U.S. government.
- Identify & discuss historical, political, social, and cultural forces, which have affected American Indians.
- Identify historical, political, social, and economic situations influencing American Indian life today.
- Analyze and explain the positions and demands by American Indians for self-determination.

#### **Required Texts:**

- 1. Colin G. Calloway (2012), First Peoples: A Documentary Survey of American Indian History (**4th Edition**), Bedford/St. Martin's press
- 2. Forrest S. Cuch, editor, A History of Utah's American Indians, Utah State University Press

Quizzes will consist of multiple choice, true/false, and/or fill in the blank questions. Quizzes are important in this course. They will give you an idea of what to expect from exams. If it appears students are not completing the readings and/or watching the required video assignments, I will increase the length of guizzes as needed and adjust the percentages allotted to guizzes.

#### Initial Paper, Midterm, Final Paper- Together 50% of Total Grade

Two papers will be required, an initial paper and final paper. The initial paper is worth 5 points and the final paper is worth 50 points individually. The Midterm is worth 46 points. Please keep in mind that organization, development, grammar, punctuation, and spelling, all count toward your paper's evaluation.
