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

### **David Stroupe's New Book Garners AACTE Honor**



The American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education, or <u>AACTE</u>, has named University of Utah education professor <u>David Stroupe</u> its 2024 recipient of the Gloria J. Ladson-Billings Outstanding Book Award for his groundbreaking "<u>Growing and Sustaining Student-Centered Science Classrooms.</u>"

His research focuses on innovative and inclusive teaching methods. He advocates for transforming classrooms into dynamic science practice communities, leveraging insights from Science, Technology and Society (STS), as well as the History and Philosophy of Science (HPS), to explore how power dynamics, knowledge sharing and agency can address issues of epistemic injustice. ## **Call for USTEM Grant Applications**



#### USTEM Hub's Collaborative Grant Award

The USTEM Hub Collaborative Grant seeks to stimulate new or emerging interdisciplinary partnerships among faculty at the University of Utah. These seed grants are designed to create opportunities for developing collaborative research initiatives that increase applications for external funding, publications, and visibility for STEM education research both within and beyond the campus community. We welcome applications that include community partnerships and connectior to policy. Additionally, proposals involving professional learning will be considered, provided that such learning opportunities are integral components of a well-defined research project.

We define STEM as a field that brings together colleagues across disciplines in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics, as well as colleagues who use a broad scope of lenses to examine disciplines (such as historians, philosophers, sociologists, and anthropologists). For this collaborative grant, we seek proposals examining challenges and opportunities around STEM education. Therefore, we highly encourage applications featuring colleagues whose expertise includes the design and examination of STEM learning opportunities. We can also facilitate conversations between colleagues who are interested in creating new partnerships to apply for the grant.

Three projects will be funded in the range of \$15,000-18,000. Eligible expenses include course releases, support for graduate or undergraduate assistants, participant support costs, or other expenses that clearly promote outcomes from a new or emerging interdisciplinary collaboration. Funds may not be used to pruchase advanced technical equipment used for daily STEM work. Still, funds could be used for technology needed for data collection (such as video or audio recording devices).

To be eligible to apply, interdisciplinary teams must:

- Consist of one or more University of Utah STEM, STEM Education, and/or health sciences faculty or faculty with expertise in STEM education.
  Include faculty members from a department or college, and/or stakeholders from a community-based organization (such as K-12 schools, informal STEM spaces, and policy arenas) distinct from the one to which the primary STEM, STEM Education, and/or health sciences faculty are affiliated.
  Have been formed recently (within the last year) and/or be working on a new topic of investigation.
- Actively pursue external funding as part of the project scope.
   Spend all funds by June 1, 2026.

The grant may not be used to extend existing grants or established research programs.

Deadline for applications: Friday, March 1, 2024 Awards will be announced on Friday, April 5, 2024

The USTEM Hub is very pleased to announce the launch of the seed grant program.
