University of Utah Prison Education Project Admits First Cohort

UPEP was featured in an article from <u>Diverse Education</u> highlighting the start of their first cohort in the Bachelor program.

"The <u>Utah Prison Education Project (UPEP)</u> here at the University of Utah is admitting its first cohort of fifteen degree-seeking students incarcerated at the Utah State Correctional Facility.

UPEP's inaugural cohort represents 'a bold expression of University of Utah President Taylor Randall's commitment to unsurpassed social impact in our state and region,' said <u>Erin Castro</u>, the associate dean and associate professor who co-founded the initiative with 12 undergraduate honors students in 2016."

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The State of Higher Ed in Prisons a Year After Pell Restoration

The <u>Utah Prison Education Project (UPEP)</u> was featured in an article on the <u>Inside Higher Ed</u> website, informing readers about the impact of the <u>restoration of Pell Grants</u>.

"Erin L. Castro, associate dean for prison education pathways for undergraduate education and director of the Research Collaborative on Higher Education in Prison at the University of Utah, said she expects to see 'sharp rises in both the numbers of colleges and universities deciding to serve incarcerated students and the numbers of incarcerated students who enroll.' At the same time, she said, 'there are a lot of questions that remain unanswered' regarding how best to serve them."

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Title IX Regs Treat Students as Political Pawns (Opinion)

Chis Linder, Assistant Professor of Educational Leadership & Policy and Director of the McCluskey Center for Violence Prevention, wrote an opinionated article on the new Title IX regulations and how they've affected different states, as well as their effect on students and faculty around the world.

"Title IX regulations are political. They <u>change</u> depending on who holds the office of president of the United States. This is ridiculous. Adding to the confusing picture, the <u>newest regulations</u>—set to take effect Aug. 1—have been <u>temporarily blocked in 14 states</u>, and a recent Supreme Court ruling calls the future of Title IX rules, any Title IX rules, into <u>serious</u> question."


